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| Vinification | The wine is made according to a traditional process that takes into account the grapes' character. This requires excellent quality grapes and the vineyard's total dedication to this process. Following malolactic fermentation, the wines are rapidly clarified and preserved at low temperatures beneath inert gas. |
